The decal's purpose is to inform law enforcement that a person with special needs or a condition that may require them to communicate differently may be present in a vehicle or home. The initiative means a step forward and a big peace of mind for families who have children with autism.

## Autism Decal Initiative

The mission of the PSO Autism Decal Initiative is to alert Emergency Responders that there is a person with autism in the home or vehicle.

The decals enable Philadelphia City & County Sheriff's deputies and other law enforcement agencies to draw on their autism training and understand that there is a person in the home or car that may not speak, respond to or comply with verbal commands, may hide, or wander off, or may have no awareness of danger. On April 25, 2023, Sheriff Rochelle Bilal and Darryl Roberts with Community Outreach, unveiled the City of Philadelphia's first law enforcement decal to identify persons with Autism in a home or vehicle.
